Reflections on Today's Readings Mark 1:29-39

Most of us have had the experience of someone meaning to offer you encouragement, say a kind word, or extend love – when we've been sick or struggling. A lot of us have had the experience of such well-intended words or actions feel like a slap in the face or a entirely clueless articulation of the uncertainty we're enduring. We mean well, but often what we intend to communicate isn't what comes across. Often I think it's because we don't know exactly what to say, but still want to say or do *something*.

Our scripture today tells of Jesus being known as a healer. So far in Mark's recounting of the Jesus story, he's been experienced as a teacher with amazing authority, a deliverer of demons, a caller of disciples. Here we hear of him healing a sick woman in words that portray it as rhyming with the chasing out of an unclean spirit. Why doesn't God heals us? We see miraculous healings of some people and sickness but not others. Is it a question of the quality or quantity of our faith?; or a question of karma?; Does God have favorites? Or it is just back then that such healings happened? Or is it just a story?

Medically today we differentiate between healing and a cure. They're related concepts, of course. Healing, however, can come in many forms other than cure. "Usually, curing requires help from a physician. The goal is to return the body, mind, or spirit to its original state and to avoid change. Curing may take less time and may be less painful, although it's an end and total removal of the problem. To heal means to repair or strengthen the body, mind, or spirit." [source PsychCentral]. How does our modern, more nuanced understanding apply to what we hear in this text?

Jesus heals the sick. The word in Greek is THERAPEO (from which we get therapy). It means to heal and cure, and also to attend to, to care for, and to minister unto. We're told that the mother-in-law immediately upon being healed get us and serves Jesus and the disciples. The Greek word is DIAKONOS (from which comes the word DEACON). It means to serve, attend, to care for, to minister unto. The words are curiously similar. What might that mean?

QUESTIONS FOR REFLECTION & EXAMEN:

- What engaged, enraged, or surprised you in this text?
- Jesus becomes widely known as a healer (therapist in Greek). How does he treat, care for; minister to the ill? Curiously to serve/minister and to cure/heal seem to be synonyms. How do we care for those who are ill or sick? How is it different, or similar?
- Peter's mother-in-law is healed and then gets right to work ministering to others. What does that say about what it means to be fully human (made in the image of God)?
- What invitation do you hear the Spirit of God speaking to you or to us, as a church to act, speak, be, or change, through this word of scripture?
