PASSING THE PEACE OF GOD

In the season of COVID-19 you're invited to pass the peace of God however and to whoever you can this day as we live our lives of disciples of Jesus sheltering-in-place, as a living sign of the Dominion of God at work moving us toward the healing transformation of the world.

Reflections on Today's Reading 2 Corinthians 5:16-21 & John 9:1-41

Our theme this Lent is Flourishing. Lent and Easter coincide with Spring; when we naturally turn towards the future, dreaming of summer, warmth of the sun on our skins, possibilities, new things. It's just as we mark the one year anniversary of the COVID-19 pandemic shutting our world down that something new, different seems possible. 1 of every 6 adults in our nation is now vaccinated. We can glimpse the new future that awaits us...and we struggle with the burdensome heaviness that we still have a ways to go.

The apostle Paul talks about seeing those who've placed their trust in Christ as new creations. A transformation happens when we no longer seek to be in control of our lives, when we recognize that the plans we had weren't necessarily what we needed, when we recognize that the way forward we saw was actually an impasse chosen in blindness. It's his way of talking about sin – what's broken in and among us – and our need to recognize it, to confess it and to be redeemed of it. It's a like a fresh start, a second chance, a new creation.

The story from John about the man born blind is both long and simple, funny and tragic, a paradox and quite clear. It blows open the notions of bad things happening to bad people as a result of their errors, sin or evil. The story challenges our notion that we shouldn't just follow the rules for the rule's sake. Rules and commandments are intended to preserve and sanctify life. And so human life is more important than faithful obedience. The story also recognizes the power of fear – in particular the fear of losing our community or connections with others.

We all want to live. We all want to live abundantly, to know love, mercy and grace. To see and be seen. And yet that's often not the case in our world and society. You'd think we'd be able to see ourselves and each other clearly, with 20/20 vision. We're all pretty much similar, sharing similar needs, hungers and hopes. But something keeps us from that. Look at the story. The only person – ironically – who sees clearly – is the blind man who recognizes and confesses what he cannot see or do on his own.

QUESTIONS FOR REFLECTION & EXAMEN:

- 1. What engaged, enraged, or surprised you in the text?
- 2. The goal of keeping the Law or commandments was to maintain a righteous relationship with God. The opposite of that is "sin." Who is guilty of sin in the story? Why?
- 3. What do the pharisees and scribe see?; not see? And the woman, what does she see?; not see?
- 4. How is the Spirit of God inviting you to *flourishing* faith through this text?
