

### Reflections on Matthew 3:1-17

Memento mori (Latin for 'remember that you [have to] die') is an artistic or symbolic reminder of the inevitability of death. The concept has its roots in the philosophers of classical antiquity, and Judeo-Christian scripture. It also appeared in funeral art and architecture of the medieval period.

If you've been to an Ash Wednesday Service you're familiar with the imposition of ashes to the participant's forehead and words spoken reminding us that we will all die. This is "memento mori." Not a fixation or idolization of death, but a recognition that death is an inescapable part of life. Thinking or contemplating our own death can lead us to the realization of how precious life is and to seize the promise of what our life can be.

This Sunday, on Memorial Day when we pause in our national culture to contemplate those who gave their lives in the services of our country, we're pausing to contemplate death in our worship service. After a year and a half of pandemic life we've often had to deal with death on a daily basis, but what does that mean for us. Worship this week is a conversational sermon with CAPC Member Carol Dolezal who also works as a chaplain, specifically with hospice patients.

While it might sound depressing, it isn't. Rather than avoiding this inevitable aspect of life, we'll be tackling it head on, reflecting around how death is part of our baptismal liturgy and process. The traditional funeral liturgy includes the phrase "in our death our baptism is made complete." What does that mean? And what does it mean that scripture says we are the delight of God?

- 1. What engaged, enraged, or surprised you in today's text?
- 2. What questions do you find in these texts for us as we re-open and re-start...as a church?
  As individual people?
- 3. What does it mean for you to envision yourself like Jesus as the delight of God?
- 4. How have you thought about death in this past year? How have you possibly avoided thinking or talking about it?
- 5. If you could talk with anyone about your thoughts about life and death, who would it be? What's stopping you from doing so?

#### Matthew 3:1-17

The Message Translation

- <sup>1-2</sup> While Jesus was living in the Galilean hills, John, called "the Baptizer," was preaching in the desert country of Judea. His message was simple and austere, like his desert surroundings: "Change your life. God's kingdom is here."
- <sup>3</sup> John and his message were authorized by Isaiah's prophecy:

Thunder in the desert!
Prepare for God's arrival!
Make the road smooth and straight!

- <sup>4-6</sup> John dressed in a camel-hair habit tied at the waist by a leather strap. He lived on a diet of locusts and wild field honey. People poured out of Jerusalem, Judea, and the Jordanian countryside to hear and see him in action. There at the Jordan River those who came to confess their sins were baptized into a changed life.
- <sup>7-10</sup> When John realized that a lot of Pharisees and Sadducees were showing up for a baptismal experience because it was becoming the popular thing to do, he exploded: "Brood of snakes! What do you think you're doing slithering down here to the river? Do you think a little water on your snakeskins is going to make any difference? It's your life that must change, not your skin! And don't think you can pull rank by claiming Abraham as father. Being a descendant of Abraham is neither here nor there. Descendants of Abraham are a dime a dozen. What counts is your life. Is it green and flourishing? Because if it's deadwood, it goes on the fire.
- <sup>11-12</sup> "I'm baptizing you here in the river, turning your old life in for a kingdom life. The real action comes next: The main character in this drama—compared to him I'm a mere stagehand—will ignite the kingdom life within you, a fire within you, the Holy Spirit within you, changing you from the inside out. He's going to clean house—make a clean sweep of your lives. He'll place everything true in its proper place before God; everything false he'll put out with the trash to be burned."
- <sup>13-14</sup> Jesus then appeared, arriving at the Jordan River from Galilee. He wanted John to baptize him. John objected, "I'm the one who needs to be baptized, not you!"
- <sup>15</sup> But Jesus insisted. "Do it. God's work, putting things right all these centuries, is coming together right now in this baptism." So John did it.
- <sup>16-17</sup> The moment Jesus came up out of the baptismal waters, the skies opened up and he saw God's Spirit—it looked like a dove—descending and landing on him. And along with the Spirit, a voice: "This is my Son, chosen and marked by my love, delight of my life."
